FIRE PREVENTION AND LIFE SAFETY REPORT

When it is time for spring cleaning, remember a clean house is a safer house. The Fire Prevention Bureau suggests that you take a few moments to check some areas in your house for hazards that could cause a fire.

LIVING OR FAMILY ROOM

- Eliminate overloaded electrical outlets.
- Minimize the number and length of extension cords.
- Allow space around the TV and stereo equipment to prevent overheating.
- Use a metal screen in front of the fireplace.
- Have large, deep ashtrays for smokers and make sure all smoking materials have been extinguished before disposal.

KITCHEN

- Keep surfaces clean and free of grease.
- Do not leave the kitchen while the stove or oven is in use. Many fires begin during unattended cooking.
- Turn pot handles in so they cannot be knocked off or pulled down by small children.
- If you have a grease fire, put a lid on it! Using water will spread the fire.

BEDROOMS

- Make a firm rule not to allow anyone to smoke in bed.
- Working smoke detectors should be installed outside each sleeping area. Test the detectors monthly and change the batteries twice a year.
- Have a home fire escape plan and practice it with your family.

BASEMENTS, GARAGE AND STORAGE AREAS

- Have the furnace, wood or coal burning stoves or any other heating appliance inspected by a professional prior to each heating season.
- Keep areas around heating equipment free of papers, rags or flammable liquids.
- Store gasoline or other flammable liquids in safety cans outside your home.

THROUGHOUT THE HOUSE

- Keep matches and lighters stored where children cannot find them.
- Post Emergency numbers on all phones.
- Do not let papers or trash accumulate.
- Unplug appliances when not in use.

It only takes a few minutes to check your home for fire hazards. You could be preventing a fire and possibly saving a life... the life of your family.

IN CASE OF FIRE - BE PREPARED

Recognizing the possibility that fire may strike your home, decide now how you would be able to save your family's lives were you to awake and smell smoke tonight!

Plan two possible routes to the ground from any upstairs bedroom. It is unlikely that both escape routes would be cutoff by flames during the early stage of fire. We recommend that every home with children conduct regular home fire drills, showing the children where to go and what to do if the normal escape route is blocked by fire.

If Fire Starts:

- 1. Arouse everyone in the house. Make it your first duty to get everyone out of the house.
- 2. Call the Fire Department at once.
 - (a) Have number posted near phone. 9-1-1
 - (b) Know location of nearest Fire Alarm Box.

If Trapped on 2nd or Upper Floors:

- 3. Jump only as a last resort.
- 4. Close door leading to hall.
- 5. Keep low, on hands and knees crawl to window.
- 6. Open window, top and bottom, place head out window and wait for help.
- 7. Use porch roof if possible.

ESCAPE RULES

- 1. Keep close to the floor.
- 2. Take short breaths and cover face with wet cloth.
- 3. Keep out of excessive heat and smoke. Feel doors, if hot don't open.
- 4. Have outside gathering point. Is everyone out?
- 5. Never re-enter the burning building.



DARTMOUTH FIRE DISTRICT NO. 1 ANNUAL DISTRICT MEETING MAY 8, 2000

Pursuant to a Warrant duly issued by the Prudential Committee of the District, the Annual Meeting of the District was held on Monday, May 8, 2000. The Meeting was called to order by the District Clerk at 6:41 P.M. who declared that 35 registered voters being present and that 35 comprise a quorum, a quorum in fact was present. Additional voters arrived after the meeting commenced totaling 38.

The Board of Engineers once again has worked hard to continue to restructure the department. With this, District One has responded to more than fifty-nine more calls this year than last year, due mostly to the new policy that all three fire districts have with the Police Department which is the 911 dispatch for the fire departments. The board is also working hard to make sure we have a truck on the west side of the bridge and automatic response by District Two when the Padanaram Bridge is closed to motor vehicles.

The fire prevention program now has five members, so we can provide more fire safety programs for our senior citizens, day care facilities and more men to teach the SAFE program in the local schools. With the help of the new men, this department now is able to offer fire safety programs at the station.

The board is proud that the new E-One pumper that was put into service this past year has responded to more than 200 calls, and has worked outstanding when needed.

Once again all equipment maintenance has been done in house or has been sent out so we can keep all the equipment in top running order. The three aerial devices will be tested later this spring by American Test Center as required by National Fire Protection Association requirement of once a year. All seven of the department's vehicles have had their annual State and Department of Transportation inspections done with no major problems found.

Once again the Board of Engineers would like to thank all the firefighters for their outstanding job and cooperation in attending drills and incidents that have occurred this year. We also would like to thank all District One residents for their continued support throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE TRAINING COMMITTEE

During the past year, meetings of the Training Committee were held regularly on the last Sunday morning of each month for the purpose of developing and implementing departmental drills and training programs to address the continuing needs of the District.

As has been the policy since the establishment of this committee, representation is maintained from all departmental ranks. During 2000, the District 1 Training Committee consisted of the following eight members:

1st Assistant Engineer Stephen W. Howland Training Officer Captain John Judson Lieutenant Antone Andre Lieutenant Kimball Baker, III Firefighter Peter Andrade Firefighter Marc Andre Firefighter Jeff Costa Firefighter Troy DeCouto

During the past year, regular bi-monthly drills have been conducted on the first and third Wednesday evening of each month under the direction of the department officers. Continued emphasis has been placed on practical firefighting applications involving both apparatus and fire ground training evolutions, including water supply and pump operation, ventilation, SCBA fitness training, boat and water rescue, and vehicle extrication. Friday morning training sessions are also conducted to accommodate members unable to attend Wednesday evening drills. In accordance with state requirements, mandatory CPR and First Responders First Aid training has also been conducted for all firefighters.

In April, nine department members participated in courses at a training weekend sponsored by the National Fire Academy in Emmitsburg, Maryland. Various training courses and seminars sponsored by the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy at both the state fire training academy in Stow and other facilities throughout the area are also attended regularly by department members.

At this time the Training Committee would like to take the opportunity to thank all of the department members for their time, effort, and cooperation throughout the past year, and ask for their continued future commitment to ensure our goal of providing quality fire service protection to all residents of the District.

EQUIPMENT REPORT

Inventorying and identifying of all firefighting, rescue, extrication, lighting and salvage / overhaul equipment within the department with truck / compartment numbers on each of the pieces of apparatus which maintains the systems integrity continues to be done by garage duty quarterly. All of said equipment continues to be in good working order.

In February of 2000 the Annual P.P.E. (personal protective equipment) inspection was performed by 1st Assistant Engineer Stephen Howland. All gear was inspected, a list formulated and presented to the Board of Engineers where it was approved and forwarded to the Prudential Committee. Purchases were made to replace worn or defective gear and distributed to those individuals.

1st Assistant Engineer S. Howland approached the Board with a request to enter into a three year plan to replace the members firefighting gear (bunker coats and bunker pants) due to general wear and improper sizing. The 2nd phase was placed on the 2000 warrant as a capital expenditure. It was approved at the annual meeting in May of 2000, purchases were made and distributed to those in the 2nd phase.

In the late summer of 2000, all of the Class "A" Uniforms arrived and were distributed to the members. Since that time those individuals representing the District have done so with great pride.

With the boat lift completing it's 1st full year of service, the Engineers have found that there has been a significant decrease in it's response time to an incident scene. With the purchase of a new portable fire pump with a 100 gallon / 100 psi capacity the department should greatly increase its firefighting capabilities.
